These days, I am most closely associated with Corinthian #2. You may notice it is not a four digit number. There were ways to get to four digits, 2222 or 2020 or some such arrangement.

I opted instead to go with the sail number of the first sailboat I ever boarded. I won't give out the number here, but feel free to join the club and find out for yourself. I have many fond memories of that boat. It was a Rebel my dad bought in the early 1960's. When my family would go out for an evening sail I remember crawling up under the deck and going to sleep with the waves slapping against the hull. I was carried off the boat asleep many times.

The boat made the front page of one of the Dallas papers (back when there were two papers). It was a wonderful fall afternoon and my folks had the red and white striped sails flying. The photographer was out on the committee boat taking shots when the committee boat whacked the side of our boat. The side of the boat punched in then popped right back out. No hole, no nothing. It was a tough, durable boat. Those photos are still up at my mom's house.

The Rebel was one of the lucky ones that just popped out of the mold as a fast boat. My dad sold the boat to Bob Gough when we moved to Austin. Bob took the boat to the Nationals and won. I believe Kelly did too. Carol Gough raced it for a number of years.

So that's the background on the new gas code. It is not a random number. It's in honor of a tough fast little boat with a proud racing heritage and a long line of skippers important to our club.

I urge you to come out and make history, or at least memories, with your boat and your family. You never know where your boat will take you.

On another topic, I'd like to personally thank all the workers that showed up for Spruce Up Day. It is heartwarming to see all the people that care about the club all working together. I'm sure we all left with a great sense of accomplishment seeing what can be done in one day. A special shout out to the painters who were painting in a gusty 20 mph wind. SNIPE FLEET NEWS

The Snipe Fleet has been busy over the winter months planning events and buying boats to position us for growth in 2010. To this end we have added two additional fleet owned boats to the lake over the last month and are working hard on a third. We are also planning several events including a College Open House in April and the 74th Southwestern Snipe Regatta in May.

Essential to building a racing fleet is putting sailors together with fast boats. The first new Snipe this season on the lake was an 80's vintage McLaughlin (26805) in excellent condition from Austin. McLaughlin Snipes, while no longer made are known as "McGo's" in racing circles and are still winning major regattas almost 25 years after they were built. The second new Snipe (30049) this year was built by Skipper in Sweden in 2002. The Skipper was a charter boat for the 2003 Snipe Worlds held in Stockholm and sailed by Brazilian sailor Ivan Pimentel who came in first on at least one race according to the builder. The Skipper is a competitive boat at the national level and has bright yellow gelcoat with gray accents. Both these boats are available in davits for sale or lease to sailors interested in racing with the Dallas Fleet. The third boat is expected early in April and will also be nationally competitive.

Coming up on Saturday April 17th is the Snipe College Open House. The Fleet is hosting this event that will allow sailors from area colleges to race the Snipe at CSC. Opportunities to both skipper and crew the Snipe will be offered to these sailors and races will be held in both the Snipe and 420's. Burgers will be served afterwards.

The second major event for us will be the 74th Annual Snipe Southwestern Regatta. This is the second oldest Snipe Regatta still held anywhere and has run continuously on White Rock since the 1930's except for a couple of years during World War II. This year the Regatta will be held on May 22-23. We are expecting at least 10 local boats and an equal number

of boats from Colorado, Nebraska, Iowa, Oklahoma, and Alabama. It should be the largest and most competitive Snipe Regatta held on White Rock in some time.

Gary is President of U.S. Sailing, a recognized commentator on sailing events, a participant in Olympic competition and Americas Cup competition and a host of other sailing activities. We are pleased that he will be present for this event at White Rock Lake. Please come and meet Gary during the day on the 24th and stay for dinner where he will make a presentation on U.S. sailing.

Once again on Friday, the 23rd commencing at about 5:30 p.m., we will have entertainment by Jody Benford and his jazz group. We will also have pizza prepared by none other than Nathan Burke and the Super Fly Pies Wood Burning Oven. FLYING SCOT MIDWINTER 2010

March 21st, the second day of spring, arrived in Dallas with 5 inches of snow. How appropriate since several Corinthian Sailing Club and Oklahoma City Boat Club Flying Scot sailors were heading to the Flying Scot Midwinter Championship. Starting the drive to New Orlean's Southern Yacht Club in the snow was not what anyone expected.

OCBC's Mike Bradshaw, Matt Baldwin, Letty and Ty Eby, knew the snow drill and had their vehicle cleared and heading down the road with the two Flying Scots in tow on the double deck trailer. It took the Corinthian sailors

a little longer to get over the snow shock. CSC was represented by FS Fleet 23 members: Kelly Gough, Scott Mauney, Mark Babb, Greta Mittman, Forest and Sam Atkins.

The first race began on Tuesday with a General Recall for the Championship fleet and on that note the "T" Flag arrived for the rest of the regatta. The sequence was restarted and the racing began in light breeze that lucky built through the afternoon. SYC's Race Committee did a great job setting a square line and managing wind changes. Courses were windward/leeward and usually ended on a windward leg. With the arrival of nice breeze, the Race Committee ran three races on the first day. Kelly sailing with Greg Fischer ended the day tied for 2nd place. Scott and Mark were in 8th, followed by Greta with crew Frank Collins in 12th and Forest and Sam ending up in 13th. The Ebys took three bullets in the Challenger fleet. Mike Bradshaw and crew Matt Baldwin finished the day in 2nd place.



The second day of racing saw breeze in the 8-10 knots range from the south and water was flat. The R/C got three more races off. At the end of the 2nd day, Kelly was in 3rd, Forest was 11th and Greta was in 12th in the Championship fleet. In the Challenger division, after day two, Letty Eby had a solid lead with five 1st place finishes and one 4th place. Mike Bradshaw had a good grasp on 2nd place



On Thursday, with an approaching squall line, the R/C gave the Scots the day off so we where able to enjoy the New Orleans sights. Some of the CSC members headed down to the French Quarters with the OCBC group and enjoyed an afternoon of sampling New Orleans beer and beverages.

On Friday, the final day, the breeze was up at 15-20 out of the North with choppy waves. Weather predictions called for steadily moderating wind; however, only 32 of 43 boats decided to brave the breeze and chop for the final two races. At the end of the final race the breeze had dropped to 6 knots but the chop was still there, which made for an interesting experience.

The regatta ended with Kelly and Greg in 2nd, Forest and Sam in 10th and Greta and Frank in 13th in the Championship Division. The Eby continued collecting 1st place and handily won the Challenger Division with Mike Bradshaw and Matt Baldwin capturing 2nd place to give OCBC a clean sweep of the division.
